Using Facebook Live to stream a Mass

1. Using a smartphone, open up the Facebook app
 - a. Before you livestream, be sure to mute your phone and put on Do Not Disturb
2. Log into your account and select your parish page
 - a. It is very important to check that you are livestreaming off of your parish page, and not your personal page (or if you manage multiple Facebook pages for different parishes)
3. On the page, find the “Live” button located under your cover photo, on the left hand side (see photo above for reference)

4. For best results, you will need a tripod with a phone attachment to hold the smartphone in place for the duration of Mass
 - a. Several types of inexpensive tripods are available on Amazon



5. When recording, set the tripod far enough away so that viewers can see the altar, ambo, cantor, etc. but also hear what is happening
 - a. You will be able to see the number of people watching, comments, and likes
6. Once the Mass has completed, click the button to end the livestream and save the video as a post on your parish Facebook page.
 - a. Once the video is posted to your page, you can edit it with a caption.
7. If you want to download the video from Facebook to post to YouTube/Vimeo and include in a parish email, follow these instructions:
 - a. Go to the video on your page and click the time stamp
 - b. Click on the 3 little dots in the upper right-hand corner and select “Download video”
 - c. The file will be saved to your phone or computer as an MP4
